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"Voice of Free Africa" in Portuguese 1800 gmt (i) 15 Oct 76 and (ii) 16 Oct 76

(i) Excerpts from announcement:

As our listeners must have heard, the "Voice of Free Africa" has been contacted by the well-known (?Pendela) Mavalane, who wants some slogans to be broadcast to Mozambique. These slogans are for you to write on walls, doors and in all possible places. So, as from today, the "Voice of Free Africa" will broadcast one slogan a day. The Mozambican people should note it down and then write it in the streets and on the walls and doors of the cities, towns and localities in Mozambique. . .

The listeners carrying out the revolutionary task set by (?Pendela) Mavalane must not let anyone know of their revolutionary activity. The "Voice of Free Africa" asks everyone to exercise care in painting the slogans, which, as from today, we shall broadcast for all our listeners.

Today's slogan is: Samora's thefts make the people blush (Portuguese: O Samora a roubar faz o povo cecar). Long live the resistance.

(ii) Excerpt from item replying to listener's letter:

Is there freedom of thought or of assembly in Angola or in Mozambique? Is there freedom of education or of religion in Angola or in Mozambique? Is there political freedom in Angola or in Mozambique? Is there freedom of the press in Angola or in Mozambique? Is there freedom of choice about where one wishes to live or the land where one wishes to work, in Angola or in Mozambique? Is there freedom of initiative in Angola or in Mozambique, granting a person the right to satisfy his personal ambition which is the basis of his very personality?

There is only one reply - No. There is only one reply - the MPLA and Frelimo fighters did not fight for the personal liberty of the Angolan and Mozambican peoples. The MPLA and Frelimo fighters fought so that the parties which they supported could have power [words indistinct] the men are slaves of the Party.

(ii) Text of announcement interrupting musical interlude:

Attention, people of Mozambique. We are going to read the second slogan from (?Nanguasuna). Mozambique, the whole nation, wants not war but bread. (Portuguese: Mozambique, toda a nacao, nao quere guerra, quere e pao). [Repetition of slogan.]
