

'No civil war in Maputo'

HARARE — Mozambique is not at civil war as many people would like to think but is fighting South African aggression that wants the country to submit to its conditions of slavery and domination, the Mozambique Ambassador, Cde Francisco Madeira, said yesterday.

Mozambicans were now going hungry because of a situation that had been imposed on them by external forces, said Cde Madeira in Harare when he received \$5 060 from the Zimbabwe National Farmers' Union.

The money would be used to buy 23 tonnes of maize meal for Mozambique.

Cde Madeira said Mozambique had rich soil but the people could not plough be-

cause of interference from MNR bandits. The food that Zimbabwe was pouring into Mozambique was "ammunition" to keep the people going so that they could fight harder to end the war.

And the Mozambique Minister of Foreign Affairs, Cde Pascoal Mocumbi, arrived in Harare yesterday for a brief visit on his way to the Socialist International meeting in Zambia tomorrow.

He was accompanied by the Frelimo deputy secretary for external affairs, Cde Luis Kabaso, and the secretary for youth, Cde Zacharia Kupela.

Cde Mocumbi told newsmen on his arrival that before his departure for Lusaka he will hold discussions with the Government on bilateral issues between the two countries. — Own Correspondent.
