## Teachers mourn Machel's death

STUDENTS continued to show their grief at the death of President Samora Machel yesterday with nearly 200 student teachers and staff of Morgan Zintec College marching through Harare singing anti-imperialist and antiracist songs.

They paid tribute to Cde Machel as a patriot and a household name in Zimbabwe at the Mozambican Embassy where the president of the student body, Cde Washington Manyonga, signed the book of condolences on behalf of the students.

A lecturer at the college, Dr Augustine Mhene, called on Africans to be conscious of the struggle being waged against the minority regime in South Africa and to remember those whose lives had been sacrificed in that struggle — including Cde Machel.

Expressing solidarity with Mozambique he said: "We can no longer sit and watch while our leaders are murdered one by one, but instead should be prepared to go and fight side by side with our comrades in Mozambique."

Some students wept as the president, Cde Manyonga, recalled that the Zintec programme was a continuation of the education programme that had begun in Mozambique and that most of the Zintec student teachers had been to Mozambique and knew Presi-

dent Machel personally.

Carrying placards, some of which read "Samora's ideals will live to eradicate apartheid" and "Samora's death will not end the struggle", the students marched peacefully to Parliament where the national anthem was sung and more anti-imperialist speeches were delivered by students and staff. One student teacher called on all Zimbabweans to sacrifice for Cde Machel's ideals.

Words of encouragement were given to the group by the deputy chief security officer of Parliament, Cde Killian Manyika, who said he appreciated the discipline and maturity that had been shown by the student teachers and staff in their demonstration.
