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Tête-à-tête raises Mozambique hopes

MOZAMBIQUE President Joaquim Chissano and rebel leader Afonso Dhlakama met face to face for the first time on Tuesday night, raising hopes for a swift resolution to the country's civil war.

The two men talked into the early hours in a five-star Rome hotel, ahead of the formal negotiations which started several hours later on Wednesday. Also present were President Robert Mugabe of Zimbabwe and Tiny Rowland, senior executive of the British conglomerate Lonrho, ments on elections and the formation
