Mr Chissano met Mr Dhlakama here at the weekend to discuss key issues which have been holding up peace talks in Rome. Renamo said in a statement issued by its office in Portugal.

The statement said Mr Chissano and Mr Dhiakama agreed that a new national army should consist of 30 000 men. the figure originally proposed by the government. They also agreed on a series of principles to ensure that a planned new security and intelligence service would respect the law and remain politically neutral, it added.
